In 2023, 360 Communities experienced remarkable growth. Our commitment to fiscal responsibility shone through as we navigated an 18% increase in individuals seeking services. This translates to a striking 47% rise in households served. More than 98% of those served had household incomes below 200% of the federal poverty level.

Our programs thrived thanks to our extensive support network of dedicated volunteers, strategic community partnerships, and the generous contributions of the community. This includes support from government grants, individuals, businesses, faith communities, schools, foundations, and clubs. This diverse mix, which expanded by 5%, fortified the organization to advance our mission: 360 Communities delivers safety and stability that improves lives.

Our impact echoes stories of positive change — homelessness averted, lives saved, families stabilized, violence reduced, graduation rates increased, early childhood development improved, and hunger addressed. Explore these triumphs in this newsletter and on our website at **360Communities.org**.






Getting help and giving hope



Melinda M — Community Advocate

 Melinda supports victims of domestic violence in honor of her son Marcelino, who died at age 23 in 2021.



For Melinda, surviving domestic violence came with a price: her young adult son, Marcelino. He witnessed his mother's abuse as a young child and the instability that came along with it. Unfortunately, in 2021, he died of a drug overdose, something Melinda attributes to him self-medicating the symptoms of trauma and not being able to access needed resources, all a part of the cycle of domestic violence. Two years later, this tragedy remains a devastating daily reminder of the ripple effect domestic violence has on families and communities. Melinda says she needed to find a positive channel for her pain.

"I can either continue to lay in the corner and cry about it — I miss my son. That's never going to change," she says. "Or I could get up and honor his memory by helping women in similar situations."

"I take every case very, very personally. It is my passion, my new life's work."

Melinda first connected with 360 Communities when she visited the Rosemount Resource Center for help paying a utility bill her abuser left her. She received the support she needed and much more — a connection to an organization that would support her vocational calling. 360 Communities hired her more than a year ago as a community advocate, working out of the Lakeville and Farmington police departments, providing critical support to victims of domestic and sexual violence.

Melinda finds her work incredibly gratifying because, as a survivor herself, she can serve victims with empathy.

"I don't see a survivor as 'less than' or a statistic, and I don't pity them," she says. "I try to empower them and remind them that they are not the person their abuser tells them they are. They are more than that and they can overcome this."

She tells them, 'You might feel overwhelmed right now, but you can do it." She always thanks them for allowing her to be a part of their journey.

Melinda's transition from a survivor to a dedicated advocate is a profound 360 Communities story. She knows the complex journey of survival and recovery and understands that some wounds will never fully heal. She is committed to making a meaningful impact in the lives of other survivors, which is a testament to her character and a tribute to her son. "Marcelino Forever 23," she says.


IN 2023, we prevented homelessness



Holistic support that stabilizes housing



Our Lewis House advocates intervene and provide safe shelter to individuals fleeing domestic and sexual violence.

In 2023, 303 individuals stayed at Lewis House. About half were children.

Our Community Resources team members provide emergency financial aid and food support that help people maintain stability.

Our Housing Support Intervention Services team is available at eviction court to connect individuals and families with financial aid, resources, and quidance to promote the most desirable outcome for tenants and landlords.

Our Partners For Success® family support workers are critical resources in schools for families facing hardships that impact the success of students. They connect them with stabilizing resources and support to ensure housing stability.



360 Communities Lewis House: A safe pathway for a survivor and her family

For Charlene, the abuse was physical, mental, and emotional. Her ex-husband inflicted beatings that escalated over time and resulted in severe injuries, including a miscarriage. She knew she needed to escape, but that would not be easy. Legal constraints, financial insecurity, and societal pressure made it challenging to break free from her abusive relationship.

Her five children were the driving force behind her decision to leave. She refused to let her children grow up witnessing the horrors of an unhealthy relationship. "I don't want my kids to think this is what you're supposed to go through," says Charlene. "And even times that I thought they weren't noticing it, they were."

Getting far away from South Carolina and starting over seemed the best option to stay safe. Her mother lived in Minnesota and could provide her with some support, but her home was not big enough to house Charlene's family.



With her children's support, Charlene made the decision. They packed their Toyota Highlander with only a few possessions and embarked on the 20-hour journey.

Arriving in Minnesota, Charlene reached out for help from 360 Communities

Lewis House domestic and sexual violence shelter. Initially, the shelter was full, but advocates offered her family temporary refuge in a hotel. Her younger children thought they were on vacation, but Charlene struggled mentally, often crying after her kids went to sleep. A few days later, space opened up at Lewis House, and they moved into the shelter.

The transition to life at the Lewis House was difficult for Charlene. She had reservations about exposing her children to a shelter environment. Charlene faced continued threats from her abuser, leaving her feeling trapped and unsafe.





However, the supportive staff at the Lewis House ensured their safety, well-being, and access to essential resources, including counseling and educational support. Advocates connected her with Minnesota's Safe at Home program for protection, which would shield their location from her abuser once they left the shelter.

With their safety needs supported, Charlene began planning for post-shelter life. She had a strong work history, so she began interviewing for jobs. It took her only a short time to land a customer service role with Delta Airlines. As she and her kids transitioned out of the shelter, 360 Communities moved alongside her and connected her with stabilizing resources like rent support, food, gas cards, school clothes, and gift cards.

"I was crying when they did all that," Charlene recalls. "I just didn't believe I was going to get that help. The staff there, they are amazing." She says the advocates met her where she was and did not lecture her about what she needed to do.

"They see things from your point of view on how you want to move forward, and how they can help you on the path that you want to take. At the same time, they are protecting you and your family."

Charlene's story is one of strength, resilience, and the power of a mother's love. Her determination to create a safe and nurturing environment for her children speaks volumes about her character. Her journey serves as a reminder that it's never too late to escape an abusive relationship and that there is hope on the other side.

"It is inspiring and uplifting to staff, visitors, and volunteers alike," says 360 Communities Food Shelf Coordinator Tom

Halloran. He says the students spent several days meticulously bringing the mural to life, turning the blank wall into a vibrant display of inclusivity and healthy food.



In addition to brightening our resource center, these students organized a successful fundraiser with the school's "Power Tuff" charity football game, raising \$1,900 and several hundred pounds of non-perishable food for the food shelf!

"Their mural promotes the welcoming environment we wish for everyone visiting us," says Halloran. "Their fundraising efforts will help us continue our mission of assisting those in need."

Thank you to this group of student leaders who found two creative ways to give back and support our mission. When volunteers and donors find ways to plug in and help, we advance our mission of delivering safety and stability that improves lives. And that strengthens our community.



Closing the doors of our Hastings Lewis House shelter

For over two decades, 360 Communities has operated two shelters for victims of domestic and sexual violence in Dakota County. In November, we were forced to close our Lewis House shelter in Hastings. We were unable to operate two shelters due to the stagnant nature of crime victim services funding in Minnesota. This decision was difficult for us and our community.

Hastings shelter residents were relocated to our Eagan Lewis House and other sites in Dakota County. We have consolidated our services and staff to continue serving victims at our Eagan Lewis House. Hope for the future

Our focus is on the future and our vision is a new shelter in Eagan on the site of our current shelter. The new Lewis House would more than double the current capacity, reclaiming the beds lost with the closure of the Hastings site. The trauma-informed design includes independent living spaces, adheres to best practices, and promotes healing.
